The Tremont Veterans Memorial Story, part 2

In the November newsletter, Tremont resident Rick Otey shared part one of the inspiring story of how Tremont came to have a fitting veteran's memorial, which celebrated its fifth anniversary on November 11, 2016.

Otey wrote of the overwhelming response to the project, which honors Tremont veterans from the Civil War through the current deployment. The Tremont Betterment Association funded the project, with Tremont Community Bank providing the flag pole and Tremont First National Bank providing lunch for the volunteer crews. People purchased 420 stones honoring individual veterans at one hundred dollars each. The project took just 73 days to complete. Over 624 volunteer hours were donated by over 35 people. Amazing!

Part 2 – By Rick Otey

In August of 2012, a group representing the veteran's memorial went to Springfield, Illinois to compete in Division II for the Governor's Hometown Award, which included towns of 1,501 to 5,000 in population. The memorial won the Governor's Hometown Award for Division II and a 3 X 5 foot sign is posted at the west entrance of town along State Route 9. The same group went back to Springfield in late September to vie for the Governor's Cup Award, which took in Illinois cities of every size. The memorial finished in third place behind East St. Louis and Chicago. The memorial was recognized in November with a buffet luncheon at the Governor's Mansion.

Rick Otey will be speaking about the project and other stories about Tremont Veterans

at our March 21st meeting. Please mark your calendar! In addition, Rick's paperback book is available for \$5.00 at the Tremont Village Hall, telling much more of the details that went in to the building of the monument.

Saving Pieces of History

Our November program speaker John Heider, a cemetery restoration specialist, presented a very informative program. John spoke of his passion – bringing neglected cemeteries back in order to pay tribute to those who are buried there. Heider explained the process of locating broken marker pieces as well as unmarked graves in fields and overgrown timber areas. Interestingly, if he is able to locate just one grave occupant he can then identify every burial site in the entire cemetery. He has methods, no machines involved, of repairing and restoring broken markers. He shared before and after photos of cemeteries he has worked on, and the differences are remarkable! But Heider doesn't stop there. He is fascinated by the stories the markers reveal. Often he will talk to the locals and do research to understand the lives and relationships of those who once lived, just like you and me.

By the end of the program, the crowd was hooked, and was interested to talk further with Mr. Heider. Because of him, the local cemeteries will hold a greater intrigue for all of us!
