#### The Story Behind that Little Boy Statue in the Park

For 105 years, the Barefoot Boy statue has been quietly observing the village of Tremont as the time passes by and the village evolves. Some in Tremont know his story; many do not.

In the late 1800s and early 1900s, a young girl lived with her family in the house that still stands today on the corner of North Sampson and Tazewell Streets. Her father, A.G. Norman, was in the shoe business in Tremont for many years. Viola Norman attended school in Tremont. And at an early age, she showed an unusual gift for drawing and painting. It was said that, "...in this (Tremont) community she was cherished and loved by everyone. Her sunny disposition made her a favorite among her acquaintances."

A neighbor, Nettie Washburn, noticed her gift, and became a mentor to her, eventually paying for her advanced schooling at the Chicago Art Institute, beginning in 1912. While a student there, Viola, for the first time ever, worked with clay. Her instructors were amazed at her natural talent. The art of sculpting was an unusual one for a woman at that time, but Viola excelled.

Her benefactor, Nettie Washburn, commissioned her to sculpt a statue of a young boy directly across the street from the Washburn home. In fact, the streets weren't paved at that time, but Ms. Washburn had a sidewalk laid from her front steps right across the middle of North Sampson Street to the statue. The steps still can be seen, though her home has been razed. Once it stood where the grassy area is, now owned by Cullinan's.

The statue, which at the time was also a working water fountain, was dedicated in a ceremony on November 7, 1915. It is said that Viola's younger brother Clay was her model. Nettie Washburn donated the statue to the town of Tremont.

After her graduation from the Art Institute, Viola became an instructor there. In 1923, she founded her own school, The Chicago School of Sculpture. She was held in high esteem by those in the art field. Prestigious people asked to be sculpted. She was even commissioned by Grace Coolidge, wife of President Coolidge, to immortalize their family chow dog in bronze.

Tragically, in 1935 her career was cut short from cancer. At the young age of 45, Viola was laid to rest in the Mount Hope Cemetery, buried in the Washburn family plot. Nettie Washburn had died in 1919, never seeing the many accomplishes of her beneficiary.

In later years, her brother Clay donated several of her sculpture busts to the Tremont Museum, where they are on display.
