Did you know...?

The Mystery of Mary Fisk Kellogg, Tremont Benefactress

It was an eye-catching headline in a 1924 Peoria newspaper:

"Mary Kellogg Leaves Estate worth \$112,000."

Doing a quick check of the comparable value for today, it appears \$112,000 would be worth about 1.8 million. \$1,000 would have been worth about \$16,000 today. Who was this Tremont woman and how did she become so wealthy?

The subject of last week's article was Mary's father, James Knowles Kellogg, one of Tremont's first schoolteachers.

Mary was born in 1845. She died from a ten-day illness of pneumonia in 1924 at the age of 79. Her 1924 obituary says:

"...Miss Kellogg was unusually well-educated, having received her early training in an academy here, conducted by her father, and having afterwards attended the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, New York. For some time, she studied art in Italy and Paris and was an extensive traveler."

Mary lived in her parents' house until her death. She never married. Her sister, Anne, died two years before, leaving Mary as the last living member of the Kellogg family. Mary had a severe stroke in 1921, resulting in paralysis. She had a beloved companion to care for her and she was able to continue being active in the Methodist-Episcopal Church.

According to the contents of her will published in the 1924 newspaper article, it appears Mary was a very devout Christian with a special concern for pastoral care. Some of her long list of bequests included:

American Board of Commissioners of Foreign Missions \$5,000

Methodist Episcopal Church, Tremont \$5,000

Permanent fund for the support of retired ministers of the Central Illinois Methodist Conference \$5,000 Cemetery Association of Tremont \$4,000.

Baptist Church, Tremont \$1,000

Rev. F.A. McCarty of Bloomington, a former Tremont minister \$10,000

Mrs. Emma McFall, treatment nurse and companion \$12,000

The list went on to include several smaller bequests, including Illinois Wesleyan University and many individuals. The article noted that two codicils to the will nearly doubled all of the amounts.

We know she donated her home (213 South Locust Street) to the Tremont Methodist-Episcopal Church and it was used as a parsonage, housing many pastoral families from 1924 until the 1960s or so, when the current parsonage was built on the north side of Tremont.

However, the article about the amount of her estate and some of the groups and individuals named raises questions. For one, how was Mary able to accumulate such a large amount in possessions and wealth? Was she a career artist? Her father was a teacher and a farmer, owning some farmland, so that may be the answer.

What was her connection to the Baptist Church in Tremont? To Illinois Wesleyan University? She had been a member of the Congregational Church in Tremont until it deeded its assets to the Methodist-Episcopal Church, then she became a member there. There is no mention of the Baptist Church otherwise. Another puzzling item was "...Mrs. Florence Peters, a sister, receives valuable personal effects." What sister? Her only sister was named Anne (or Ann). She had no sister-in-law; her only brother died at age 3.

Research so far has turned up nothing more about her life, which likely was an interesting one. So we are left with mysteries.

Sampson Street Update

Tremont's front door re-opened in grand fashion with a parade down the Sampson Street corridor on Friday, October 1. Tremont Police led the Homecoming festivities organized by the High School Student Council. The number of spectators was impressive as the THS Marching band, royalty, and student floats meandered down the recently renovated street. A perfect fall afternoon celebrated both the long anticipated near completion of the first phase of this much-needed street revitalization and the most precious of resources – the youth of our community.

To complete this first phase, the switchover of power lines from old to new – along James and South Streets, is tentatively scheduled for the week of October 18. An evening will be selected and beginning around 6:00 PM, the 100 and 200 blocks of S. Sampson will have a power outage lasting 6-8 hours. After this time, power will be restored and the switchover will be complete. Businesses and residents will be notified soon once a hard date has been established.

Comcast has been contacted and notified they are in the clear to begin attaching their facilities to the new utility poles and reestablish their connections to the properties on this stretch of Sampson St. Existing utility poles will be removed once Comcast has finished their relocation work.

Installation of new lighting is contingent upon the removal of existing utility poles as well as supply chain issues. The updated status from the light pole supplier has an estimated shipping date at the end of this month.

The reconstruction of the 100 block to Route 9 is still expected to begin next year after the Turkey Festival.

Winning Communities continues to raise funds for the aesthetic portion of this project that includes landscaping and other amenities like benches, tables, and other decorative pieces to be added as funds allow.
