#### **Meet the Candidates Video**

April 6th is Election Day and five candidates are running for three positions on the Tremont Board of Education. Three incumbents – Renee Kaiser, Todd Kilgus, and Volkan Sumer – are running for reelection while Michael Henderson and Jeff Reynolds are two newcomers challenging for a seat. Voters can select up to three candidates on Election Day.

Each candidate was recently interviewed virtually by district superintendent, Sean Berry, using questions submitted by the public. ### Did you know...?

#### Boyle's Grove: A Sampling

Last week's article told the story of Boyle's Grove, "The most popular resort in Central Illinois," not far from Tremont. Area newspapers in the late 1800's and early 1900's were dotted with articles referring to the resort two miles west of Mackinaw. There was even a rail stop at nearby Minert's Station, serving as a mode of transportation to and from the Grove. Reports of picnics for school, Sunday school, social and family groups were many. Below is just a sampling of the reports in the Bloomington Weekly Pantagraph about the pleasurable resort.

#### September 7, 1883

"Mr. H.O. Hoffman and a number of his lady and gentleman friends constituted a picnic party that went to Boyle's Grove Sunday and spent the day fishing in the Mackinaw River and picnicking on its banks. They returned last evening, but they were not heavily laden with fish."

#### June 12, 1885

"Mr. Johnnie Sims, the expert pigeon shot, goes to Boyle's Grove today to join Mr. Eugene Hampton in a match to be shot today against Messrs. Jacob and Harts Puterbaugh of Tazewell County, two of the champion shots of their locality."

#### September 3, 1886

"A party of boys camping out at Boyle's Grove are reported to have shot a large gray wolf yesterday. If the report is true, those boys will be a set of heroes with their fellows."

#### June 24, 1887

"The G.A.R. (Grand Army of the Republic) post has decided to have a picnic, and will invite neighboring posts to join them at Boyle's Grove. No date has been set, but the Ladies' Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans will be invited."

#### July 15, 1887

"Mr. Boyle talks of building a hotel in his grove to accommodate the people that will seek his all-year-round resort. He sees a large boom and is happy."

#### August 5, 1887

"The westbound passenger train of the I. B. & W., which passed Boyle's Grove (at Minert's Station) about 1 p.m. on Thursday, set fire to the grass of the right of way of the road near Mr. Boyle's house. The railroad fence caught fire from the grass and 64 rods of it were consumed. From this fence, a cross fence on Mr. Boyle's farm ignited and the fire rushed toward his barn at an alarming pace. The neighbors flocked to the assistance from all directions and, but for their aid, the barn and residence must have been destroyed. It was a close call and the horses and cattle were removed. About 40 acres of Mr. Boyle's pasture was burned over, which at this time of the season is in itself a serious loss...".

#### August 29, 1890

"There will be a two days' blackbird shoot at Boyle's Grove August 27 and 28. On Wednesday the purses amount to \$25 and Thursday the purses amount to \$29."

#### May 15, 1891

"Mr. John Boyle of Tremont is having a toboggan slide built at his place. The run will be from the bluff above the old mill dam down to the iron bridge and return."

#### February 2, 1894

The Weekly Pantagraph reported about a group of men spearing black bass and channel cats by spotting them through the ice, following them until they hid under some leaves, cutting a hole in the ice, and spearing them. The fish that were caught weighed from 12-15 pounds each. "One fishing party got 100 fine fish, another 120, while a third got 200 pounds of choice ones."

#### July 12, 1895

"At Boyle's Grove, near Mackinaw, are two natural curiosities. They are the Rachel Cave and the Great Otter Slide. The cave can be entered only when the river is low. One can go back with a lantern about seventy yards, when one comes to a twenty-foot precipice where the water pours over it in a stream about three feet wide and a foot deep. This precipice is called the 'Snake and Shoe'. It derives its name from its resemblance to a snake's head and to a large shoe. The head resembles that of a large snake and the body that of a high-top lady's shoe.

"The 'Otter Slide' is near the cave and is about twenty feet high. It is caused by a spring flowing out of the hill and down over blue clay, which when wet, is very smooth. The otters collect there at night and slide from the spring down into the river."

#### August 16, 1895

"W.F. Gerstner and Co. are building a fine farm residence for Martin Boyle at Boyle's Grove on the Mackinaw." (This must refer to the second home, built after the first burned down.)

#### July 21, 1899

"The DeMolay band of Bloomington are picnicking at Boyle's Grove on the Mackinaw, and give a band concert every day at 8:20".

From these and many other newspaper articles, it is clear that today's idyllic spot by the Mackinaw was once a lively and fun-filled place for people in our area to enjoy nature and take a reprieve from their everyday lives.
