Tazewell County Underground Railroad Project

The public is invited to the first in a series of Underground Railroad Recognition Events in Tazewell County. According to Tazewell County Clerk John Ackerman, "The purpose of this series of ... events is to properly recognize the work of these individuals, bring public awareness to the existence of the nationally celebrated Underground Railroad in Tazewell County, and most importantly to add a permanent marker at the gravesites of these individuals for future generations indicating their involvement as a Underground Railroad Coordinator. It is our hope these efforts here in Tazewell County will be copied in the future by counties throughout Illinois and beyond."

The first event will be held on March 9 at 4PM at the Hirstein Cemetery in Morton. The second of the series will be in Tremont to honor our four known Underground Railroad leaders, date TBA. These events will be outdoors, with plenty of room for masked social distancing.

The series is sponsored by The Tazewell County Genealogical and Historical Society, NAACP Peoria Branch, Morton Township Board and Tazewell County Clerk, John Ackerman.

Did you know ...?

Captain Wibray of Tremont Part 1

To say there once was an accomplished sea captain among our earliest residents at first sounds crazy. Here, in the middle of the prairie? But it is good to recall that many of our earliest settlers came here from the east coast.

Our sea captain has an interesting story in which, at one point, he was a hero:

Captain James Wibray was born in England in 1786 and spent his childhood in London, dreaming of going to sea. As a teen, he signed on as a cabin boy on a tall sailing ship. Over the years, he learned the ropes and became an experienced seaman. Then, in 1812, there was a huge earthquake in Venezuela and 10,000 people died in Caracas alone. The fledgling United States sent its first foreign disaster mission to help. Wibray was on a ship that carried provisions and food to the devastated people. Later, he became co-owner of his own ship, Brig Charles. The shipping trade really accelerated after the War of 1812.

By this time, Wibray and his wife and young children lived in New York City. By the early 1820s, he was Commander of the Brig Reindeer, taking month long trips across the Atlantic to bring passengers to America by way of the port of New York. Eventually, he became a shipmaster on a series of packet ships, medium-sized ships which transported mail, freight, and first-class passengers. The trips were shorter, only about 18 days, but very dangerous. His run required an extremely skilled pilot, as it was through perilous waters from New York to New Orleans.

His November 1834 trip was a fateful one. He was leaving New York Harbor. At that time, a small "pilot" ship would come out to guide the ships through the rocks and shoals that made navigating so difficult. This time, however, when the pilot ship arrived, it was apparent that the pilot was drunk, and as a result, Wibray's ship became grounded on a rocky reef. The ship was taking on water in a strong gale. The passengers were terrified that the ship would break up, taking them with it. According to Helen Wibray Witherspoon, his great granddaughter who wrote about the incident about 100 years later, Wibray, "…seized the pilot, had him put in irons below deck, and took the wheel. He managed to free the vessel from the rocks and to take it safely into the harbor."

In gratitude, the passengers presented the captain with a large, elaborate sterling silver coffee service engraved:

Presented to Captain James Wibray by the cabin passengers of the packet ship New Jersey under his command, in testimony of their personal esteem for regard and high consideration of his skill and indefatigable exertion in rescuing his ship from the perilous situation in which she was placed while in charge of the pilot on the 16th of November, 1834.

This unusual gift became a family heirloom cherished long after James Wibray had passed. But...there is much more to the story of Wibray and of the sterling silver coffee service, as well. (To be continued next week.)
