Did you know ...?

The Demise of the Tazewell County Courthouse in Tremont

According to the August 9, 1889 Pantagraph, the old courthouse at that time, stood, "...vacant and alone, a mute monument to departed hopes and a silent memento of past prosperity."

It had once been a majestic building, and the center of Tazewell County legal activity with the likes of Abraham Lincoln, Adali Stephens, and David Davis frequenting the court. What had happened? History tells us.

Obtaining the county seat for Tremont was quite an accomplishment back in 1835, just as the new village of Tremont was being settled. Losing it in 1889 was a blow that could have meant the town's death knell. An old history states that the loss came about starting as far back as 1839, "...when a complaint was raised by the people of Pekin against the county seat being in Tremont, and there upon began a bitter warfare between the two places."

Court continued in Tremont, and the town continually grew with businesses largely due to the influx of people coming to court. But trouble was brewing, and finally a petition to move the courthouse to Pekin was circulated. There were so many signatures that a vote was finally taken. The majority of the county approved. The decision was made that the town of Pekin and the area around it would erect a courthouse without cost to the county, within two years. Pekin claimed victory and was recognized as the county seat in 1850. Foreseeing the possibility of a similar disagreement in the future, Pekin succeeded in having a law passed to allow them to keep the county seat permanently.

Bitter and disillusioned, many people, including Josiah James, one of Tremont's founders, left Tremont.

John Harris, another founder, had originally donated the land for the courthouse. He appeared in court to try to recover the property, as it had been given specifically for the purpose of the courthouse. The court ruled against him, and Abraham Lincoln appealed the case to the Illinois Supreme Court. But the judge there ruled that the deed was not absolute; the county seat would remain in Pekin, and Harris could not recover the property.

The courthouse in Tremont was to be used exclusively for the purpose of education. In a letter from a Mr. Shaw, dated 1850, he writes, "In a few days the courts will be removed and the courthouse vacated... there was some talk of using the building for a Normal School house (to train teachers), but the establishment of such an institution would require the contribution of a fund by the state, and the state is too poor and indebted to make grants of the kind..."

For several years, a Professor Snow taught there, until the school was unable to support itself.

Many organizations used the large upper rooms for years, for club dances, amateur plays, and the yearly Catholic fair, among other activities. Later, the lower rooms were used as tenements.

An article entitled, "Historic Tremont" from the Peoria Herald Transcript of January 1905, described the

demise of the courthouse in this way, "...little by little, as the years glided by and the proper and timely repairs were not made, it began to decay and crumble. The swallows that flitted by took possession of it. The woodpecker...defaced the columns that so majestically supported its roof...now, with its cupola gone, and its rooms uninhabited, it seemed to look at the observer in abject humility.

Finally, the building reverted to the heirs of John Harris. His daughter, Mrs. E.C. Saltenstall became the owner. But by then it was so run down it would have been dangerous to occupy. In 1895, the old building was sold and razed. Tremont contractor William Brown built a house there. He was able to use the old building's wood and other items in its construction. Today, some of those pieces, including the door key, a boot scraper, and a stained glass window, are now on display at the Tremont Museum.

In 1956, the Illinois State Historical Society placed a marker at the end of what had once been the 140 foot wide Broadway Street. The marker is all that is left to remind our residents of the courthouse that had stood there so proudly, and the long ago lawyers, judges and clients that occupied it.

Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten registration for the 2021-2022 school year is underway. If you have an incoming Kindergartener, please register your new student at <u>https://www.tremont702.net/o/grade-school/page/registration</u>.

The purpose of kindergarten screening is to do the best job we possibly can balancing our kindergarten classes by ability. Research shows that young children learn best when classrooms consist of children of varied learning levels. A balanced or heterogeneously-grouped classroom allows all children to learn from the teacher and each other.

Another reason for kindergarten screening is to give parents more information about their child's readiness skills, especially if they are considering waiting another year for their child to begin school. The results of these tests will show the range of the child's skills. Any child who is 5 years old by September 1 can enter Kindergarten regardless of scores. Sometimes parents decide to wait a year; that is their choice, not a district requirement.

Kindergarten screening for registered students begins Tuesday, April 27, from 8:00-3:30, and continues on Wednesday, April 28, from 8:00-2:00. All Covid policies are in effect; children must wear masks, and teachers will sanitize between students.
