Did you know ...?

What Became of Tremont's Founders?

They were the visionaries of a settlement on the Illinois prairie. Josiah L. James and John H. Harris were friends and had traveled to Illinois together from their homes in New York. While there, they decided to return to New York to gather a group of people together who would be willing to move and start a colony. From those gathered, the two men, as well as William Sampson, were chosen to travel back to Illinois to choose a location.

A promising spot was located, and the three men laid the town out, to be called Tremont for the three obvious high points in the flat, nearly treeless prairie. The settlers arrived, and the town was established in 1835. (Earlier articles here described how the young town grew and even became the seat of Tazewell County. However, the town suffered when the county seat was moved to Pekin permanently in 1850, after only about 15 years.)

The town stumbled a bit at the setback but continued to do well. But by 1850, only one of the three founders remained. The main street in town has always been called Sampson Street, though originally, North Sampson Street was one of three main streets around the public square, where the earliest business district was located. When the railroad came to town in the 1860s, the business district began to move to the South Sampson Street area. However, William Sampson was the first to leave town, after only a few years. He moved to Como, Illinois, but ended up in Chicago, where he died of cholera in 1851. Why he left is not known for sure. However, history is unclear whether Sampson had been appointed Tremont's first postmaster, or if it was actually his brother. In any event, whoever it was, there were some legal problems, and the postmaster had to resign. Maybe this humiliation had something to do with William's departure?

Losing the courthouse to rival Pekin permanently was a bitter pill for many in Tremont, including Josiah

James. He was interested in politics, so in 1850, wasting no time, he bid Tremont farewell and moved to Chicago. It was there that he died in 1866.

John Harris actually had the most reason to leave. After all, he had personally given the land specifically for the courthouse square, and when the county seat was moved, he was not allowed to have his land back. However, he stayed in Tremont his entire life, as did many of his descendants.

Despite losing two of the three founders who had envisioned the town, and the all-important county seat as well, Tremont has continued to thrive as a close-knit, civic-minded community. ~Tremont Museum and Historical Society
