### Did you know...?

#### **Tremont and Prohibition 1920-1933**

Nearby Peoria was a boom city from 1850 to the early 1900s, known as "The Whiskey Capital of the World." It was blessed with a great supply of grains, cool underground water, rail and river transportation, investors and, unlike many areas of the country, supportive politicians. All taken together, they made Peoria a natural for the massive production of good whiskey and beer, more than any other place in the country. But by 1920, that all came to a halt when the 18th amendment to the U.S. Constitution went into effect. As of January 1 of that year, the 73 distilleries and 24 breweries in the city ceased production. Their huge charitable contributions to the City of Peoria also stopped, hurting the city and leaving thousands unemployed.

Though not in such a dramatic way, Tremont was also affected. Since its beginning, taverns had always been popular; in fact taverns were some of the first businesses in the new village. In the two decades leading up to the passing of the 18th amendment, Tremont had approximately seven taverns and restaurants that served beer and/or whiskey. But when prohibition began, the taverns closed. One saloon owner, Ed Cooney, sold his tavern in 1919 to Guy Kinsey. Kinsey turned the place into a "soda pop store."

This same transition was seen in many towns in America. Saloons became soda parlors. People turned to creative soda drinks and, because of improvements in refrigeration, ice cream as well. Soda fountains were also installed in drug stores. Drug stores were the only legal places to purchase alcohol, and only for medicinal purposes. At these drug store soda fountains, "soft" drinks were served and gained popularity. In some stores, however, some drinks were not exactly "soft." (There is no indication that happened here, though.)

According to a 1985 Pekin Times article by Tremont resident Susan Sommer, some of the then old-timers remembered the so-called "dry" years. The article quotes Clark "Shorty" Barton, William Koch, and another anonymous Tremont source on the clandestine activities at one Tremont location during prohibition. At 310 (some sources say 308) South Sampson, there once stood a general store, built in 1897. Then, in about 1916, the building was converted to a busy noodle factory owned by Benjamin Koch. In 1925, the building became a private residence.

Even in the midst of prohibition, home brew could still be purchased at that residence. The men who were interviewed in the 1985 article reported that a still was located in that house and the brew could be smelled some three blocks away, likely giving their secret away! The men said the government found out and demolished the still, thereby ending that particular source of home brew.

Prohibition ended in 1933. Many restaurants immediately began serving alcohol and highlighting that fact in their ads. Taverns began to open once more. Tremont continued on its way. However, because of the 13-year interruption in production, our neighbor, Peoria, never could regain its former growth boom or their "Whiskey Capital of the World" status.
