# **Tremont High School Industrial Program**

#### THS REVIVES INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM Sean Berry, Superintendent

One of the most common (and valid) concerns I heard during my time as high school principal was about the school's limited programming for students interested in the trades. When the decision was made to discontinue the industrial technology (a.k.a "shop")

program 13 years ago due to budget constraints, opportunities for students became limited. The return of an agriculture program a few years later helped to address some of what was lost, but not entirely. Finally, after more than a decade, THS is again offering an industrial technology program that includes an introductory level course along with courses in carpentry, metalworking, and computer-automated design.

The program was able to be added without the need for additional staff. A staff departure from another subject area led to some courses being shifted around and assigned to other staff members. This opened the door for reviving the industrial technology program without adding a new teaching position to the budget. Shane Chandler, a 2004 THS graduate and product of the previous industrial technology program, was hired to lead the program after teaching for more than a decade at Limestone.

The program currently has 53 students enrolled for the fall semester. Due to some space limitations and because it's the first year of the program, courses were purposely limited in size. More classroom and shop space will become available as the robotics team completes its building project on the east side of the school. The area the Roboteers will vacate within the school will become an expanded area for the industrial technology program.

Along with the industrial technology program, THS continues to offer an agriculture program. Caitlin Hays heads the Ag program in her first year at THS. Ag courses provide further opportunities for students to work with their hands and learn trades-related skills. The industrial technology and ag programs are currently sharing equipment in the existing ag shop but will have separate shop areas once the robotics building is complete. Workbased learning also continues to be a priority for the district through both the cooperative job program that allows students to earn credit for maintaining employment and the workbased learning program through Illinois Central College, which includes courses in nursing, EMT, fire science, welding, and construction.

We've been very fortunate to receive some donations to assist the industrial technology program and are very thankful to those who have been so generous. If you'd like to donate materials, tools, or other supplies to the industrial technology or agriculture programs, please feel free to reach out to the school. #### Did you know...?

#### Boyle's Grove Resort - "The Most Popular Resort in Central Illinois"

Early Tremont newspapers are dotted with articles about various groups in Tremont meeting for outings at the popular resort at Boyle's Grove. These activities were a very popular form of entertainment at the turn of the century. Located about three miles southwest of Mackinaw by a sandbar on the Mackinaw River, the Grove was a favored spot for recreation and relaxation.

John and Sara (Miars) Boyle moved to the Grove in 1872. Their first house burned; the photo is of their second home, built in 1895 by W.F Gerstner. At least two generations of Boyles made their home there over the years and began their resort, called Boyle's Grove.

The (Bloomington) Daily Pantagraph, May 29, 1887, called the resort, "...the most popular resort in Central Illinois." This lovely spot was the location of much fishing, wading, boating, shell collecting, games, picnics (even moonlight picnics!), camping, and shooting matches. Bands entertained and speakers spoke at various events.

The switch at Menert Station on the Big Four railroad line was a convenient stop, very close to Boyle's Grove. Groups made good use of the stop. The railroad sponsored a special train which left Bloomington at 8:30 in the morning for Menert Station/ Boyle's Grove and returned at 7:00 that evening. There was room for one thousand people and the fare was fifty cents for a round trip. On June 30, 1894, a picnic for employees of the Big Four was held there. The special train for picnickers started in Indianapolis, and fifteen more coaches were added in Urbana. It stopped at all of the stations to pick up employees and their families.

An article in the Bloomington Weekly Pantagraph of September 3, 1886 recalls: "...five coaches filled with 300 Sunday school children, teachers, parents and friends of the (Mackinaw) Christian Church enjoyed one long and delightful day on the banks of the Mackinaw...Some very fine fish were caught by the expert anglers. Boating was a great attraction for the young people, while swings, croquet and gathering shells were amusements for others. Mr. Boyle, as usual, was everywhere, looking after the comfort and good of the excursionists, making his house as open and free to everyone as the grove itself..."

Until 1887 or so, it appears that day trippers had to wade across a ford in the river or cross by boat to get to one part of the Grove. But an article in the Weekly Pantagraph, November 26, 1886 reports, "The new iron bridge at Boyle's Grove will be completed this week, when that pleasant resort will be made still more agreeable to...visitors. The town of Tremont will pay one-half, while the County of Tazewell has paid the other half."

As the century turned, groups from Tremont such as churches, lodges, and families made good use of the prime recreation area just a few miles east of town. It is easy to imagine men carrying baskets of blankets and lunches and women holding their parasols while lifting their long dresses to avoid dust or mud as they made their way from the train. And it is so easy to "hear" the joking, laughter, and high-spirited conversation as they looked forward to fun and festivities ahead.

It is unclear when the Grove closed as a resort, but today the secluded spot is peaceful and pastoral, giving no hint of its former heyday.
