Did you know...?

Tremont's Village Blacksmiths

Blacksmiths were vitally important to the early settlers. Anything iron, such as plows, rakes, pans, wheels, door latches and horseshoes, was forged by the village blacksmith. Purchasing these and other items at a hardware store was impossible on the prairie. As a result, blacksmiths were very important, well-paid members of communities.

When Tremont was first settled in 1835, Philander Dean set up shop. There may have been others. No doubt they were very much in demand. Likely, they were located near the center of town at that time, which was the Public Square (City Park). In about 1840, in that same vicinity, Fred Neiting opened his business. These would have been the men who were helping Tremont's first citizens to settle and to care for the feet of their invaluable horses.

In 1864, Alfred Dean set up shop, possibly with Philander Dean.

In the mid-1860s, John March opened a blacksmith shop about where today's community center is. Later his son, Littleton G. March, took over. Littleton's sons also joined him in the business, which continued until Littleton's death in 1938.

Another early blacksmith was noted on the 1891 plat map. He was located on East Walnut Street, about where the education addition to the Baptist Church is today. It is possible it was James Paine's shop.

In the 1890s, a blacksmith building was located on South James Street next to the alley, opposite today's grade school. This shop, Barkdoll and Miller, was originally owned by Jacob Barkdoll, whose implement buildings were located around the corner on South Street. Other blacksmiths later operating from this location were P.E. McCrane, and the Abbott brothers. Around 1900, Ernest Suchert bought the building and did traditional smithy work there, as well as machine work. He spent decades of his life there. Later, his sons Hans, George, and Herbert joined the business. Suchert died in 1951. Ernest Shaefer bought the shop in 1950, which he ran until 1984, when he retired. The building was sold to the Library Store, who replaced it with a large warehouse.

Around 1900, George Voelpel also became a blacksmith in town, though we are unsure of the location of his shop.

As time passed, hardware stores opened. Blacksmiths no longer were needed to make everyday tools, kitchen essentials, iron latches, etc. However, blacksmiths rebounded as they were still needed for iron repair work and welding, small engines, and the forging of shoes for horses.

When the automobile became popular, blacksmiths had to evolve once more. They worked on small engines and continued to repair iron items. Some began selling lawn mowers and chain saws. However, despite their efforts, the blacksmith became obsolete. Tremont's last blacksmith shop, Ernest Schaefer's Tremont Blacksmith Shop, closed in 1984.


