Tremont's Widely Acclaimed Horseman

There's a quite a story to be told here. You've passed this simple road sign many times as you've driven down State Route 9 to Pekin. But did you realize that once there was a huge farm there, with apple orchards, hogs, and 50 or more Percheron horses at all times? These horses were muscular and large; their ancestors were the type of steed that knights of old once rode into battle. However, in the 1800s, Percheron horses were used for farm horses – actual horsepower.

The owner of the farm, Archie Leslie Robison, Jr. was a widely acclaimed importer, breeder, and judge of horses. He sailed to France 26 times in his lifetime, where he selected twenty to thirty Percheron horses each time. He was awarded the equivalent of the French Legion of Honor for his service to agriculture. Archie was an advisory member of the College of Agriculture of the University of Illinois, which he had attended as a student. For nine years, he served as a member of the Illinois State Fair Board.

The Robison family were prominent members of Tremont. Archie and his sisters and brothers grew up at Leslie Farms and lived in a 19-room mansion called by many, "The White House." His father, also Archie L., built the home in 1898.

The train stopped regularly at a station near their home, called Leslie Station. Carloads of horses were

shipped around the country from there. He held annual sales, which were attended by buyers from all over the states, including Canada.


Then there came a time when literal horsepower was replaced by steam power. Archie then changed his business model and for about ten more years, he developed an exclusive clientele, supplying wealthy horse lovers who wanted prize horses on their show-place farms.

Next time you pass the "Leslie Farm" road sign, imagine a stately white Victorian Mansion, a small railroad station, and an impressive horse farm there.

The Tremont Agricultural Heritage Museum has a display about Archie and his horses.
