Josh Dickey named next President of the First National Bank in Tremont

TREMONT, IL – July 10, 2023 – The Board of Directors of The First National Bank in Tremont is pleased to announce Josh Dickey has been named to succeed June A. Kidd as President of the Bank, effective March, 2024. Ms. Kidd will remain at the Bank as CEO until her retirement on June 30, 2024.

Dickey started his banking career as a teller at United Community Bank in 2009. In 2013, he was hired by The First National Bank in Tremont as a loan officer. Did you know...?

In 1881, John Tisserat sold hardware from his newly built building on the south end of block 28, lot 7, in Tremont, according to a plat map from that year. It became known as the Tisserat Building. We would know that area today as the corner of South Sampson and West South Streets, or as the location of Gauger Motors, owned by Bob Boston.

A 1905 article in the *Peoria Herald Transcript* recalls that Tisserat's Hardware store was sold to H.J. Schmitt in 1894. Schmitt's Hardware sold hardware and seeds. In 1906, J.W. Baylor bought the building and opened his hardware store.

George Gerstner bought the building in 1927, opening Gerstner's Hardware. Later, his son, John also known as Socky, joined him. Some may still remember his pet bulldog, Pepper, who would sit on the steps of the store, checking out the action on the street. Everyone knew Pepper.

In 1934, George received a Chrysler-Plymouth agency in partnership with his son John. The move from hardware store to auto agency was likely a natural one, given that owners of the first autos bought fuel at hardware stores before gas stations became common

The building has been altered through the years. The part of the building closest to Sampson Street was Joe Pflederer's tire shop. Later, Joe became a mechanic there. When John took over the auto dealership in 1945, he built an addition with a large window for the auto showroom. In 1964 George retired, and John had the front of the building removed. An office was erected, along with a parking lot for the agency.

Around 1976, Foster Marine moved in when their building burned down. It had been located on the alley facing the First National Bank. Immediately after, they set up shop in the large building that is today Louisa Jane, Inc. But a heavy snow caused the flat roof to cave in, so Foster's moved to the vacated Tesserat Building, where they continued to operate their boat business.

From the time Foster's closed until about 2004, the building saw a succession of businesses. In that time, the building housed a chop shop, Howlett Industries, a karate studio, an arcade, a dance studio, and possibly others. Don Gunther then owned the building, which he later sold to the Tremont First National Bank.

In 2004, Bob Boston's business relocated from the corner of Walnut and South Sampson Street to the Tesseret building. His old building was demolished to make way for the (1964) First National Bank's new drive-up area. The bank had worked out a trade with Bob. The original location of Gaugers was started in the 1920s by Eli Gauger and was later run by his son Wally. After Bob purchased the business, he kept the name of Gauger Motors. When Gauger Motors opened in it's new location, it was obvious the building was very old, just judging from the worn wood floors.


This July (2023), Gauger Motors closed for good, and Bob Boston retired, with many words of praise from his customers. It is also the end for the old Tisseret building on that corner. The 142-year-old building is showing its age. In need of major repairs, it will be torn down to make room for a parking lot for the popular Share Closet next door. The Share Closet has said there are other plans down the road for the corner. And a new chapter begins...
